ARC brings together a wide range of expertise at the interface of air transport and airports, and local and regional administrations. A common concern is to promote and to balance at the same time the benefits generated by the airports (revenues, jobs, transport network...) and their environmental impact (noise, air quality, urban limitations). A balance that can only be reached with the establishment of a direct and honest relationship between the local and regional administrations and the airport authorities, supported by a shared common vision and with best practice proposals.

OUR VISION is to bring together a region and an airport and to facilitate their interaction and cooperation on all levels, ranging from governance, economy, environment, urban planning and mobility. Their collaboration will further help to improve residents' quality of life, to avoid, prevent, minimise and compensate the negative impact of airport activities. 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Why Regional Airport & Aviation - Strategies?

Airport and aviation industry are up in the political agendas in many regions. Airports are critical enablers of national and international connectivity and major gateways to business and leisure visitors. In addition, airports and their surroundings often cluster business, R&D, and training activities in a variety of aviation-related fields.

Not surprisingly, citizens, industry groups and the broad business community urge governments to produce policies and projects and to take full advantage of the region's strengths in these fields, seek and exploit opportunities and address shortcomings.

What barriers hamper Airport & Aviation Strategies?

In a lot of cases, regional authorities and airports follow different logic, have different priorities, and do not have a deep knowledge of each other ecosystem, besides that they are respondents to different stakeholders. This is a challenge to constructive dialogue when both sides seem to speak different languages.

Moreover, regional governments can play a more active role in airports and aviation in all areas described below.

Owner / Manager

Regions may have a dominant or a minority stake in the airport management entity. Even in these cases, authorities and airport companies have different natures and purposes, which may lead to interferences, conflicts of interest, and unwise decisions.

Regulator / Governance

Regional authorities may have regulatory and governance roles in a variety of aspects relevant to airports such as:

- Land Planning and Zoning
- Land Accessibility and Public Transportation
- Training and Skills
- Customers Rights, Customer Service
- Public Safety / Industrial Safety in Landside Areas
- Pollution and Noise

Promoter

Regional authorities may invest resources in a variety of domains that are aligned with the airport's interests such as:

- Tourism promotion
- Vocational training and skills
- Air route development schemes
- Public Sector Obligations (PSO) contracts
- Business and talent attraction
- Promotion of industry clusters
- Availability of land for industrial and commercial developments

Partner

Regional authorities may eventually become partners with airports to develop strategic projects under joint-venture or PPP arrangements.

What is the situation in most airport regions?

As a general overview, it can be concluded that, except for some exceptions, most regions lack a comprehensive airport and aviation strategy. Or it may be at an early stage in its formulation, or not being transversal enough to bring together different departments and agencies.



What ARC offers? Based on ARC's 28-year experience with more than 60 regional and local authority members, we offer technical guidance to assist regional and local governments to help them to develop their own airport & aviation strategy based on an approach guided by a strategic analysis with the evaluation of various options for the development of airport-related businesses.

The outputs of this technical guidance may include:

- The assessment of the baseline, enabling conditions, success factors, and perceived opportunities and risks for air routes development, cargo and logistics, MRO, industrial and commercial activities, grounded aircraft yards, training, and aerospace, among others.
- The identification of relevant stakeholders and engaging them in constructive thinking about airport development options to set the foundations for a Regional Airport & Aviation Strategy.
- Benchmark relevant examples to illustrate options.
- Proposal of governance arrangements and roadmap to implement the strategy.



This technical guidance can be tailor-made to adapt to particular circumstances and contexts.





Do you want to know what is going on at your airport?

The digitalisation of aviation offers new solutions to obtain big data and convert it into valuable information. Deep and extensive knowledge can improve airport governance because stakeholders can use it to strengthen relations with airport and aviation authorities and stakeholders, mainly airports and airlines.

Therefore, Airport Regions Council and one of its more active members, Aeroports de Catalunya, are glad to present a toolkit to fulfil one of the essential needs of local and regional administrations regarding airport activities: reliable on-time information.

Toolkit in a nutshell

Kair.Aero is a dashboard that allows territories to **monitor airport operations** and **estimate carbon emissions**. The dashboard is provided by a centralised IT platform which collects data and computes indicators.





Kair.Aero is a toolkit developed by airport experts and aimed at airport operators and territories, comprehending the complexities of management and the impacts of airport operations. The information provided is accurate and specific. It enables managers to understand causal relations and identify suitable attributes to improve decision-making processes.

What do you get?

Every day you get the following information about previous day:

Operations

- Departures and arrivals by hours
- Departures and arrivals by airlines

On-Time Performance

- Distribution of delays for a given day
- On-Time Performance by airlines
- On-Time Performance by hours

Emissions

- CO2 and NOx by hours
- CO2 and NOx by airlines

Specific arrangements can be developed on demand:

- Comparison of the number of operations for two specific periods.
- Comparison of airports' performance.

European Funding: How to Secure and Manage EU projects



Security incidents Root Cause Analysis

Wildlife Hazard Management

This training course has been developed by Maximiliano Gutiérrez Contreras, Gema Victoria Orgaz Romero, Alfonso Herrera Bachiller and Unai Fuente Gómez. With extensive and varied personal experiences in biology and engineering, they currently make up the SEN-ASA's team of biologists advising the Spanish Civil Aviation Safety and Security Agency on issues related to the risks for aviation associated with wildlife. In addition to carrying out their tasks as Airport Inspectors, they have participated in the celebration of the National Wildlife Committees, in specific Working Groups on vultures and pigeon keeping activities, in the elaboration of the Wildlife Map of interest to Aviation and in the update of Doc 9137.
