On behalf of airport regions

Taking part in the legislative evolution

The ARC members gather more than 70 million citizens living nearby an airport in Europe. As such, the ARC is recognised as the voice of regional and local authorities in aviation related debates.

The permanent presence of the Secretariat in Brussels allows for involvement in the legislative process at European level. This has brought us in close contact and collaboration with European Economic and Social Committee, the Committee of the Regions or the European Commission.

Airport Package

The Airport Package is the set of legislative proposals presented by the Commission in December 2011, with the view of « creating more capacity » at European airports.

The ARC adopted its position on the subject early in 2012. The ARC position has been widely disseminated and publicised. The texts are to be approved early in 2013

Noise- Environmental Noise Directive

The two main EU texts on noise are the noise at airports directive (revised into a Regulation within the Airport Package) and the Environmental Noise Directive. A consultation was launched on the latter in which ARC took part.

State aids to airports

The Commission is aiming at modifying its guidelines related to State aids to airports. This text may affect ARC members and hence we are looking at how to best represent their views.

Collaborative Decision Making Guidelines

The ARC took an active part to the elaboration of the CDM guidlines by Eurocontrol.

A strong commitment to our members and what they stand for.







Developing knowledge

One of the many strengths of the ARC is the ability to detect and reflect on long-term challenges encountered by airport regions. This has allowed the organisation to take the lead in a number of fields.

Through various projects and working groups, the ARC supports the dissemination of knowledge and a better understanding of the issues that airport regions have to face through Europe.

Economic development group: two publications available for members

A study on the impact of the rise of Gulf Carriers was commissioned by the members and undertaken by the secretariat. The document underlines the changes in the economic predominance's of airlines at world level, the fact that traffic routes are evolving. The larger airports

regions, where European carriers' hubs are based may see this change as a threat while smaller airport regions may see this as an opportunity to access the "new silk roads".

The ARC secretariat also prepared proceedings of the a conference organised by our member, SOWAER, which was dedicated to "airports as poles of economic development". This booklet presents a synthesized version of the most important contributions.

Surface Access and Climate Change (SACC) - the dAIR project

The need to lower carbon emissions from surface access to airport is one of the key learnings of the ARC work in the previous year.





As a follow up, the ARC is taking an active part to the dAIR project. This is an EU-funded project (INTERREG) that aims at lowering the carbon emissions at airports, through greener airport operations and greener public transport access. Six of the ARC members are taking part, namely the City of Vienna, Mazovia, El Prat, Malta, Prague Airport Region and Stockholm.

Intermodality

The ARC is chairing the working group on intermodality from the European Commission Observatory on Airport Capacity. In this role we are closely associated to the work of the Observatory in general.

This work within the Observatory has placed the ARC at the forefront of discussions on capacity, and has allowed us to promote the notion of "environmental capacity."

Noise and environment

Noise is one of the most publicised environmental issues in airport regions. In some regions noise is an issue, and other regions are striving for noise not to become an issue.

ARC is active in the leading reflection fora, conferences, legislative working group (INTERNOISE, X-NOISE, CAEP, CNOSSOS)

Air Traffic Management

ARC pioneered in 2001 the reflection on the linkages between ATM and spatial planning. Ever since it has contiunously highlighted the importance of the coordination and shared information between the two.

A workshop on the topic was held in Vienna in November 2012, paving the way to further cooperation with both EUROCONTROL and Air Navigation Service Providers (ANSPs).

FAIR: Funding for Airport Regions

FAIR is a guide, initially drafted in November 2012, where funding opportunities for airport regions are made known to ARC members. This guide is updated on regular basis, according to the published calls and is available to ARC members.

Communicating to our members

Communication is key to the fulfilment of ARC objectives.

In 2012 we have been continuing our communication activities with which the members were accustomed, at the same time added new ones and started developing future ideas.

As communication leaders for the dAIR project, we have also been heavily involved with developing strategies, websites and social media for the project as well.

Website

The ARC website has been completely redesigned from the ground up in 2012, providing more functionalities, easier navigation and overall a pleasant design.

The members now have also the possibility to communicate directly on the website, through a comment section below each article.

Newsletter

The ARC Newsletter came out four times in 2012, with information from members, interviews and feature articles. The December issue was the last issue of the quarterly newsletter, which is being replaced in 2013 with a biweekly one which is being sent to both ARC members as well as partners and external stakeholders.

In the secretariat

In the secretariat is the new ARC informail sent only to members notifying them of specific information of interest, projects, activities in which they may be interested.

Social media

In 2012 the ARC has entered the social media sphere, with accounts on twitter, LinkedIn and Facebook. They will help extend the reach of the organisation into audiences that were not covered before. These networks are used for disseminating our information through specialized funnels, being able, for example on linkedin to target aviation professionals from different groups. The Facebook and Twitter pages have been continuously gathering more followers.

dAIR Project

The ARC is the communication leader of the dAIR project and as such in 2012 produced two newsletters for the project, a brand new website, kept partners of the project in contact and has been constantly identifying and publishing news relevant to the decarbonisation of airport regions. We have disseminated information from the project to ARC members, thus spreading the knowledge acquired and developing new links.




airport network. The overall passenger traffic growth at Europe's airports remained almost flat, with an increase of just +0.6%

Organising events for our members



Airports as poles of economic development

This event, organised by SOWAER (Société Walone des Aeroports) in collaboration with the ARC was a two-day conference on the importance of the airport in the framework of economic development of airports.

Mediation in Airport Regions

The one day conference, organised in by our member, Prague Airport Region looked at how issues at the airport can be discussed effectively with the citizens in the area. Members were able to hear from experts on the topic and also present their specific situations.

Air Traffic Management and Spatial Planning Workshop

The one day workshop, organised in the framework of the ARC ATM group with the benevolence of the City of Vienna looked at specific issues in Air Traffic Management, Spatial planning and the co-existance of the two within new frameworks developed in the EU.

Getting dAIR - towards decarbonised airport regions
